



# **CARBON FOOTPRINT**


The Sustainability Office is adding the finishing touches to the first comprehensive carbon footprint for the College of Saint Benedict and Saint John's University. Previous greenhouse gas inventories have focused on each institution separately being completed by different staff with different methods. For FY23, data was collected and analyzed using an online carbon footprint calculation tool known as the Sustainability Indicator Management and Analysis Platform (SIMAP). This platform was created by the University of New Hampshire's Sustainability Institute to track, analyze, and improve sustainability efforts, specifically for higher education institutions. Campus partners across numerous departments were supportive in collecting data necessary to complete the carbon footprint. The Sustainability Office sends huge thanks to the departments that helped gather this information: facilities and physical plant, transportation, grounds, culinary, business offices, campus mail, center for global education, and more.
